- Proposal Planning: Effective grant proposals are grounded in well-conceived projects with <u>clear</u> goals, <u>measurable</u> outcomes, and <u>realistic</u> budgets. Good grant writers work closely with the grant seeker to ensure that proposed project is viable.
- Persistence and Resilience: Rejection is inevitable in grant writing. Good grant writers don't get discouraged by temporary setbacks. Instead, they view rejection as an opportunity to refine their skills and look for ways to improve future proposals.

## Tips on How to Choose the Right Grant Writer

- Check References: Always ask for and follow up on references. Speaking with previous clients can provide valuable insights into a grant writer's skills and reliability.
- Review Writing Samples: Request samples of previous grant proposals. This will give you a sense of the grant writer's style and proficiency.
- Look for Experience: While everyone has to start somewhere, an experienced grant writer will have a proven track record of securing funding. Look for someone who has successfully written grants for similar types of projects or organizations.
- Assess for Fit: A good grant writer should understand and be passionate about your organization's mission. They should be able to articulate how your goals align with potential funders' priorities.
- Trial Projects: When considering a novice grant writer with limited experience, start with a smaller project or a trial period to evaluate the grant writer's performance before committing to a long-term contract.
